

GOLIAD HISTORY: Goliad is one of the oldest municipalities in Texas. In 1749, the Spanish government transferred Mission Espiritu Santo and its royal protector, Presidio La Bahia, to the site of a small Aranama Indian village, which they named Santa Dorotea; this mission served the Araname, Tamique, and their allies for 110 years, longer than any other Spanish colonial mission in Texas.



Señora de Loreto de la Bahía, known more commonly as Presidio La Bahia, or simply La Bahia is a fort constructed by the Spanish Army that became the

nucleus of the city of Goliad, Texas, United States. Originally founded in 1721 on the ruins of the failed French Fort Saint Louis, the presidio was moved to a location on the Guadalupe River in 1726. In 1747, the presidio and its mission were moved to their current location on the San Antonio River. By 1770, the presidio had been rebuilt in stone and had become "the only Spanish fortress for the entire Gulf Coast from the mouth of the Rio Grande to the

the "Mississippi River". A civilian settlement, modern-day Goliad, sprang up around the presidio in the late 18th century, and the area was one of the three most important in Spanish Texas.

Goliad History



During the 1836 Texas campaign, Colonel James Walker Fannin's force surrendered in defeat at the Battle of Coleto Creek. The Texian soldiers were imprisoned in the presidio for a week. On Palm Sunday, March 27, Col. Fannin and his 341 men were marched outside the walls and shot, making Goliad the site of the largest

single loss of life in the cause of Texas independence. The Goliad Massacre, which accounted for twice the loss of life as that at the Alamo, was, in part, the inspiration of Gail Borden's headline, "Remember Goliad! Remember the Alamo!," which become the rousing battle cry of the victorious Texians at the Battle of San Jacinto



The remains of the prisoners were left exposed for the vultures and coyotes until June 3, 1836, when General Thomas J. Rusk was passing through Goliad in pursuit of a retreating Mexican column. After gathering the remains, Rusk had them buried with full military honors. On June 4, 1938, a massive pink granite monument was

dedicated on the site as part of the Texas Centennial



Carole A. Allen 1934-2013



Carole was born in Dallas, Texas on August 8, 1934 at St. Paul Hospital. She had one older sister, Claudine. Her father owned a moving & storage business. She graduated from the Texas School for the Deaf in 1952 and

Carole Carpenter, TSD 1952 spoke many times of the old school building called "The Tower." She married Lewis Stovall on September 6th, 1952, who is the father of all her children. She later married, Frank Allen on August 6th, 1978, and they were married for 34 years. Frank's parents were deaf so his first language was "sign." She is survived by her husband, her sister, and three daughters, Cindy, Lisa, Sheri: eight grandchildren, eight greatgrandchildren. She was preceded in death by her son, Sonny. Her best friend for 61 years was Dorothy Butler. Carole was a homemaker for many years, but also worked for the Post Office. She became very ill in February with pneumonia and had to be hospitalized. She never recovered from that initial illness, spending 4months in rehab in Rowlett then McKinney. After spending 2-1/2 weeks in the hospital, she was transferred to a nursing home on Wednesday before she died. Her family was at her side when she died peacefully in the early hours of July 22, 2013. There was a private family graveside service held on July 26, 2013 at Restland Memorial in Dallas.

RECIPE

Granny Cake

By Glenn Brunson's niece Carolyn Zak



1 ½ cup sugar

2 cup flour

½ tsp. salt (omit if using self-rising flour)

1 tsp. baking soda (omit if using self-rising flour)

2 eggs

1 (20 oz.) can crushed pineapple in its own juice (including juice).

1 cup brown sugar

1 cup chopped pecans

1 cup evaporated milk

½ cup sugar

1 stick margarine

1 tsp. vanilla

Mix the sugar, flour, salt, soda, eggs and pineapple together and pour into a 9x13 pan. Sprinkle the top with one cup brown sugar and one cup chopped pecans.

Bake at 350f degrees for 45 minutes.

Cook the milk, sugar, margarine, and vanilla until mixture comes to a rolling boil.

After the cake is baked and right out of the oven, pour the cooked milk mixture over the entire cake.
