

FCC ATTORNEY OFFERS GUIDANCE ON DIGITAL TRANSITION (by William Roller, Yuma Sun Staff Writer) March 11, 2008

attorney An from the Federal Communications Commission addressed the Yuma, Ariz. chapter of the Hearing Loss Association of America last week about the changeover from analog to digital broadcasts. Michael Jacobs, FCC consumer affairs legal counselor, spoke about plans to end analog broadcasting by February 2009. "Many think they have to get a flat screen high definition television to get reception after the transition," said Jacobs, "but that's not true." Consumers can still use their old analog sets, said the Yuma Sun, but will need to purchase a digital converter box to receive a TV signal. With deaf consumers relying on closed-captioned TV for news and entertainment, "HLAA is an important partner of ours in getting word out about digital TV," said Jacobs.

SAFEPLACE WITH OPRAH Ford and Oprah's Big Giveaway

Ford is trying to lure car buyers, bit by bit, through word-of-mouth and reputation as part of its "Drive one" campaign. The latest effort involves giving back to local communities in an Oprah kind of way.

As a sponsor of ABC's Oprah's Big Give, Ford hosted more than 1,100 viewing parties around the country on April 6. The events recruited Ford owners to call friends, neighbors and relatives and invite them over to watch the show.

The winner, Victoria Fernandez of Austin, Texas, will be featured in a 90-second video during a commercial break on the season finale of Oprah's Big Give. Fernandez received two Ford vehicles and \$25,000 to "pay forward" to SAFEPLACE, a local women's shelter. Ten other winners also got a Ford vehicle to donate to a person or charity of choice.

The effort with Oprah, via JWT/Team Detroit and House Party, Irvington, N.Y., is part of Ford's overall strategy to create brand ambassadors from its 750,000 force of employees, retirees and dealers. Ford is encouraging them to talk to friends and relatives about the merits of the Ford brand and urging them to "Drive one, a campaign that launched last week.

"The whole idea here is simple but powerful," said Connie Fontaine, Ford's experiential marketing manager. "Our idea is that having a neighbor tell you that Ford is good is better than Ford telling you that." Ford spend \$1.76 billion on U.S. advertising last year (excluding online). RECIPE

POTATO CASSEROLE

By Glenn Brunson's sister

2 pkg. 12oz. shredded frozen hashbrowns

1/2 cup melted butter

1/4 tsp. pepper

2 cups grated sharp cheddar cheese

1 tsp. salt

1 can cream of chicken soup (undiluted)

1/2 cup chopped onion

1 pint sour cream

Defrost hash browns. Combine in large bowl with 1/2 cup butter. Add salt, pepper, onion, and soup. Mix well. Add sour cream and cheese. Blend thoroughly. Pour into greased 9x12 casserole. Bake at 350 for 40 minutes. Can be fixed in advance & frozen.

A NOTICEABLE CEMETERY GRAVE

Cemeteries have their own graves whose shape and design stand out among others on the same grounds.

At the Sunnyside Cemetery in Long Beach, CA, one such monument stands out it is the grave of Dr. Albert Rhea who was buried in 1907.

Rhea was a late deafened physician who was hit by a street car and was instantly killed. Being deaf he was not able to hear and move out of the way of the incoming vehicle.

Not sure if there were other cemeteries whose highly visible monuments were erected to honor the deaf.

HAPPY MOTHER'S DAY ON MAY 11, SUNDAY

In 1907, Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948), a Philadelphia schoolteacher, began movement to set up a national Mother's Day in honor of her mother, Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis. She solicited the help of hundreds of legislators and prominent businessmen to create a special day to honor mothers. The first Mother's Day observance was a church service honoring Anna's mother. Anna handed out her mother's favorite flowers, the white incarnations, on the occasion as they represent sweetness, purity, and patience. Anna's hard work finally paid off in the year 1914, when President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed the second Sunday in May as a national holiday in honor of mothers. (Copied from DeafDigest)
