## HANNAH MAENIUS TO CHALLENGE IN TAIPEI

When Hannah Maenius steps onto the track in Taipei next year, she will become the first Olympian in Fredericksburg history.

Through she will not be competing in Beijing during the 2008 Summer

Olympic Games, Maenius will run the 800 meters and the 4x400 meter relay during the 2009 Deaf Olympics held in Taiwan.

"It is a very special opportunity for me to show others that having a hearing impairment does not limit my abilities as a runner and the drive to win," She said.

Maenius won the University Interscholastic League (UIL) AAAA state title in the 800 meters as a senior at Fredericksburg High School.

Currently running track and cross country at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, she set the school record in the event during the 2007 season with a mark of 2:18.08.

She was selected to join Team USA for the Deaf Olympics after her story became publicized in the Austin American-Statesman in 2005.

Sometime between the age of 6-10 months, her mother, Jeanenne Maenius, said Hannah lost hairs within the cochlear of her ears, which caused the hearing impairment. At age 12, Hannah received a cochlear implant, which aids her in hearing. Mrs. Maenius said hearing split times is difficult though for Hannah as the times are called from her left and the implant is on her right. For Maenius, the journey to Taipei began with competitive running during field day at

Stonewall Elementary, she said and took shape during seventh grade track when she first ran the 800 meters.

Now the deaf American record holder in the event with a time of 2:11.2, she has set her sights on a gold medal in 2009. "We always thought she'd be good enough to complete internationally," Mrs. Maenius said.

After Taipei, Hannah will likely take some time off, as her collegiate eligibility will expire prior to the Olympics.

From there, the future is yet to be written, Mrs. Maenius said, thought Hannah has shown interest in competing in the 2012 Summer Olympics in London. Being hearing impaired has not affected her running ability, Hannah said, and her fellow teamates and competitors have been understanding. "Most athletes I compete with are extremely friendly and have no problem talking to me, she said. "There will always be people who look at me as though I have something wrong with me, but in reality I don't and I have learned not to let those few bother me." Her advice for young athletes, both with and without hearing impairments:

"Never let anyone tell you 'you can't.' If there is something you really want to achieve, don't hold back, just go for it," she said.

"There will be obstracles along the way, but use them to make yourself stronger and more determined." (Copied by Fredericksburg Standard Radio Post Newspapers August 6, 2008)

## **FACT OF THE DAY:** black cow

The "black cow" or "root beer float" was created on August 19, 1893. Frank J. Wisner, owner of Cripple Creek Brewing in Colorado, served the first root beer float. Inspired by the moonlit view of snow-capped Cow Mountain, Mr. Wisner added a scoop of ice cream to his Myers Avenue Red root beer and began serving it as the "Black Cow Mountain." The name was later shortened to "black cow."

Labor Day is a national legal holiday thatis over 100 years old. Over the years, it has evolved from a purely labor union celebration into a general "last fling of summer" festival.



In 1884, the Knights held a larage parade in New York City celebrating the working class. The parade was held on the first Monday in September. The Knights passed a resolution to hold all future parades on the same day, designated by them as **Labor Day**.

## RECIPE


## **CREAM CHEESE SQUARE**

- 2 Cans Crescent Rolls
- 2 8 oz. pkg cream cheese
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 egg (separated)
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans (optional)

Grease 13x9 inch glass pass. Preheat oven to 325\*. Lay 1 can of rolls on the bottom of the baking dish. Add together the cream cheese, vanilla, 1 cup of sugar, and egg yolk. Beat and spread over dough. Lay the other can of rolls over the cream cheese. Beat egg white with a fork and spread over the dough layer. Mix 1/2 cup sugar with cinnamon and pecans. Sprinkle on top. Bake 30-35 minutes or until golden brown. Cool and cut into squares. This is a quick and easy recipe and delicious.


