

Kent Kennedy, a guest speaker at TAD-SC Meeting last August, who works for CSD and is president of the Texas School for the Deaf Alumni Association, gave a short speech. He cited some interesting Texas statistic: 2.2 million deaf and hard of hearing individuals in Texas; 8,500 deaf children; 2,000 hard of hearing children; 3,000 children with cochlear implants; 1,800 certified interpreters; 753 deaf/blind individuals, mostly in Houston and surrounding areas; and 58 regional schools plus TSD. STORES, RESTAURANTS HELP DEAF CUSTOMERS

Ginger Hampton hadn't worked at the drug store on South Congress Avenue for very long when the deaf customers started to teach her signs. "I write down the prices if I can get it across, but most of them can read my lips," she said as she sipped coffee at the Sanders Drugstore coffee counter. It was mid-afternoon and the store was deserted. "You can have a lot of fun with these people. All of them are real nice. They used to kind of scare me. I guess it's because they're different." Hampton said. "It scares anyone anytime you can't communicate." Hampton has learned enough signs so that when a deaf customers indicates he wants a Coke by pointing his right index finger at his left forearm, like giving a hypodermic shot, she knows what it means. "They'll teach you. Most people think that they're ignorant and stupid. They say, "Look at those stupid. They say, "Look at those stupid people over there waving their arms." There are a

few...but most of them are not," she said. Her co-worker, C.A. Fink, has worked at the drugstore for 25 years. He learned sign language a long time ago. "If you want to get to be friends with them, you want to speak their language." Fink, who took a sign language course at a neighborhood church, doesn't know "the short-cuts of their language," but he can communicate with the deaf who frequent the store near the Texas School for the Deaf. "I have a lot of respect for the deaf. They're just like you or me. I like to help them," Fink said. If a deaf person comes in the store with a sore throat or cough or maybe "they want some film but don't know what size," Fink helps them. The short, balding man also makes phone calls for his deaf customers, but refused once to make a call. "One deaf man wanted me to ask his boss for a raise. I wouldn't do it. But I 've even called for dates, to a rent a house, on business and to make doctor appointments." Sanders Drugstore is one of the few places in Austin that stocks alarms with a flashing light hookup. J.W. Sanders who has operated the drug store and soda fountain since 1946, has known many deaf persons. He hasn't learned sigh language. "They're kind of lonesome people at times, and if you know sign language, they 'll want to talk and keep you away from work," Sanders said. "Most of the time, If they want a favor, they write "But it consumes time to it down. communicate with them. I might be prejudiced, I don't know. I want to help them but...." said Sanders. RECIPES

PRUNES OR DATES CAKE

- 3 eggs Beat well
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup Mazola Oil
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup buttermilk with teaspoon soda
- 1 cup chopped prune or dates (prune or dates with little flour)
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon allspices
