**MAN MISSING FROM STREETS NOW
LIVING IN WIMBERLEY** *(He is deaf and
doesn't talk much.)*

Family took in Jerry, to relief of many who feared for his safety.

Wimberley – At first, the kindness of strangers made Jerry a target.

Now, it may have save his life.

The homeless man known to many South Austinites as Santa Claus is safe and sound in Wimberley, taken in by a family after the combined efforts of police, state protective services, his relatives and other people who cared. Rumors had flown for weeks after he disappeared from his usual spot on South First Street near Ben White Boulevard, and after the appearance of an impromptu memorial Thursday, many feared the worst. But although he misses the fresh air from being outside all day, **Jerry, 63**, now has a nice place to stay, a comfy chair to sleep on- he hasn't gotten used to beds yet-and an assurance that the semiweekly beatings he endured are over.

Saturday night, sitting in the kitchen of his new home, on a 14-acre property, Jerry was reserved, responding with brief answers to questions written on paper because he is deaf. He's asked that only his first name be used to protect his privacy; the family that took him in requested the same. "I didn't know people was gonna know I was gone," he said. "I didn't think nobody would be that interested."

The people who took him in said that for years they had offered to let him stay with them but that he insisted he could take care of himself. But as winter approached, they felt he just wasn't safe any longer. Soon after, various agencies and friends began a concerted effort to convince Jerry that he needed to leave South Austin.

"There are a lot of good people in Austin who helped Jerry out with food and money," said Sgt. Art Arevalo, supervisor for the Austin Police robbery unit, who helped coordinate the effort. "Unfortunately there's a criminal element that also knew people gave him food and money....He was being robbed and beaten for his food."

Arevalo said some of Jerry's family in Austin had tried before to persuade him to get off the streets. The answer was always "no".

Arevalo met Jerry in November, 2006. He had just been robbed. Arevalo noticed how often Jerry was getting hurt and robbed on the streets and started to worry.

"My thought was if we didn't do something, someone is going to kill him," Arevalo said, "They knew that he was a defenseless old man."

It took about three more months of visits from family, protective services, police and the friends who ultimately took him in to convince Jerry. The night he agreed, Jerry had just been beaten up again, Arevalo said. "A lot of people helped do this," he said. "Jerry is in a safe place and thriving."

Now he spends the day relaxing at home, where he enjoys watching science fiction movies with closed captioning. He has learned to do his laundry, use the microwave and make coffee. But asked whether he thinks he'll stay in the home forever, he wouldn't commit.

"I don't know," he said. "I ain't decided."



Friday and Saturday, hundreds of people came to admire a plaster sculpture made to remember Jerry and to scribble memories in two notebooks. Bob Ratliff, who made the sculpture, said he was relieved Jerry was safe and hoped to give him the notebooks.

Vernon and Joan Pate are planning to move to Tucson, Arizona on the first week of March to be near Joan's children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. They are very excited. They will stay there for good. *Good Luck and Enjoy life in Arizona, Vernon and Joan!*

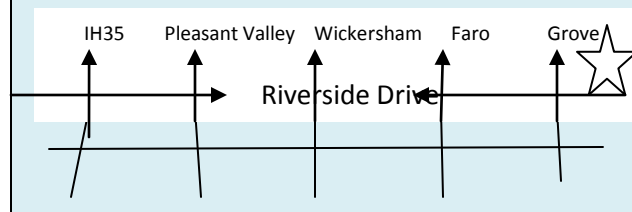
